- The court has not declared an item of account unlawful after a person made an appeal under section 28(3) of the Act.

The Annual Internal Audit Report, Annual Governance Statement, Accounting Statements, an analysis of variances and the bank reconciliation plus the information required by Regulation 15 (2), Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015 including the period for the exercise of public rights still need to be fully completed and, along with a copy of this certificate, published on the authority website/webpage* before 1 July 2026.

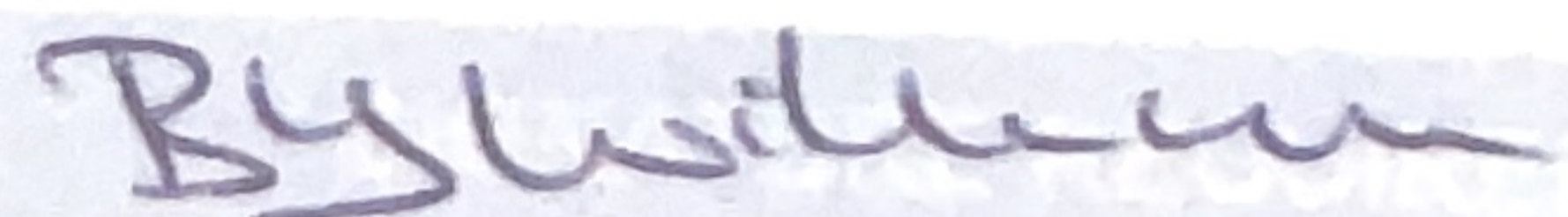

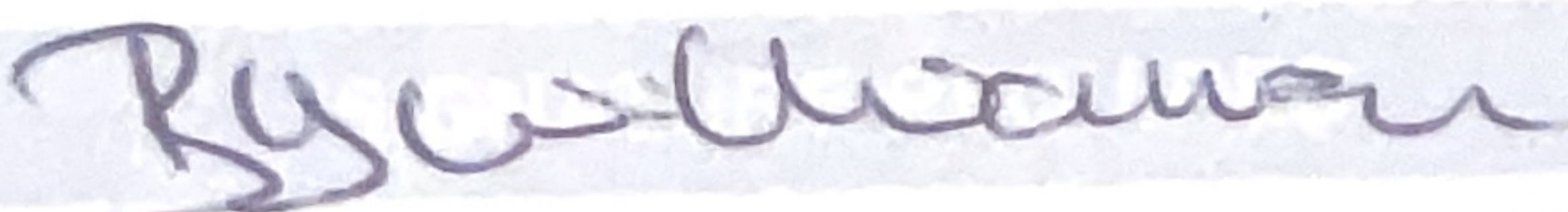

- Despite having £183 less to carry forward compared with last year MPC have done very well to balance the accounts so effectively. We are just short of £400 of having the sufficient funds in the bank for a years' worth of expenditure should no income be received.
- All costs have risen greatly especially annual fees of which we have no control over.
- We must be conscious that there is no Model Agreement payment this year which accounted for around £3600.
- A large amount of maintenance work has taken place. The regular maintenance tours have helped identify specific tasks which has helped in planning & budgeting. It is a good idea for these to continue.
- It will be important to consider items requiring large expenditure as in Annes Bridge which MPC are committed to contributing £500 for the forthcoming year. Such expenditure does require monitoring.
- Cutbacks are everywhere. NYC are limiting their own expenditure so it is possible services might be reduced or in some cases if standards are not as residents want MPC will have to fund additional work but inevitably this will impact on future precept requests.
